Louise Stone Adams, 86 passed away after a lengthy illness on Wednesday, December 25, 2019 at her home in Noxapater, MS surrounded by family. Funeral services will be Friday, December 27 at 2PM at Stephens Chapel Funeral Home in Philadelphia, MS. Interment in Mars Hill Cemetery in Winston County. Visitation will precede the service Friday beginning at 12 noon.

Mrs. Adams was born in Itta Bena, MS to parents Herman and Dolly Stone but grew up in the Zama community near Kosciusko, MS. She married Edsel Adams in 1952 and in 1955 they moved to Greenwood, MS and lived there for 22 years. Mrs. Adams was a telephone operator at South Central Bell and later a mother and homemaker.
